WHY I LOVE AFRICA

"In the highlands," wrote Karen Blixen in Out of Africa, "you woke up in the morning and thought: Here I am, where I ought to be." Exactly. I know that feeling, having shared it more times than I can remember, and it happens only in Africa.

The highlands she was referring to are the Ngong Hills of Kenya, just outside Nairobi, and the great plains of Maasailand that stretch deep down into Tanzania's Serengeti national park. This is Hemingway's Africa, hoisted 6,000 ft into the sky, and although you may be no more than a hundred miles from the Equator, the air is sharp and dry, like the finest English summer's day.

Why do I love Africa? What's not to like? For a start, the sense of distance is mind-blowing. In this, the most overcrowded millennium of all time, space is becoming the world's most priceless luxury, a last retreat in which you can still find room to breathe.

That is why a safari holiday should be on everyone's wish list. In Hemingway's day this meant setting off with a tent and a rifle into the back of beyond where the wild things are. Not any more. Today, guns are out and eco-tourism is the buzzword in the bush.

But the reasons for going on safari have not changed. The need to reach out and touch the wild; to sleep under the stars, live in the open and come face to face with Africa's storybook animals - lions, elephants and the rest - not behind bars but moving free as the wind across the boundless savannah.

So where should you go for your first taste of safari life? Africa is so vast. Some of its game parks are the size of small countries. Among the finest are Botswana's miraculous Okavango Delta, Zambia's Luangwa Valley and South Africa's famous Kruger park. But I would always choose East Africa. Nowhere are animals so visible or as numerous as on the rolling grasslands of the Serengeti and Masai Mara, and to look down into the immense bowl of the Ngorongoro Crater is to stand at the gates of heaven.

MORE TO SEE

Kenya, birthplace of the safari, is Africa of the imagination. A land of game rich savannahs, vibrant cultures, flamingo pink lakes and the Great Rift Valley, visible from the moon.



he 'Out of Africa' landscapes of the Masai Mara are the stuff of legend, a free range wilderness of such broad horizons that mixed herds of five or six different species can often be seen in a single frieze. The star billing may be reserved for the Mara's exceptional population of big cats, but the main event is the annual migration of a million or so wildebeest. Pursued by hungry predators, they are at their most vulnerable (and photogenic) when crossing the crocodile-infested Mara River.

There's a wide choice of places to roost, offering every style of bush living - Mara Plains Camp for example, with its en suite copper baths and wide decks for those 'forever' views; Kicheche Valley Camp, whose six traditional safari tents on the Naboisho Conservancy are popular with honeymooners; and the more family


oriented Sala's Camp, in the south east corner of the Mara and close to the wildebeest river crossings.

Across the Rift Valley is the Laikipia Plateau, a place of untamed beauty which stretches from Mt Kenya to Lake Baringo. Ranch style lodges here offer the staple diet of game drives, bush walks and sundowners, as well as swimming, tennis and fishing to keep all ages amused.


Best of these are OI Malo, an exclusive retreat whose signature 'bush breakfasts' are worth the journey alone, Kicheche Laikipia on the OI Pejeta Conservancy and Lewa Wilderness in the shadow of Mt Kenya. There is every chance of seeing the 'big five' on Lewa's private lands - and without the crowds - but you can also walk, ride and even take to the skies in a yellow biplane for an exhilarating bird's eye view of the 62,000 acre ranch.



Samburu - In the north of the country, its rugged, thirsty landscapes fed intermittently by the lazy Ewaso Nyiro River whose waters are a magnet for game in the dry season.








The Coast - 300 miles of blinding white sand lapped by Equatorial waters perfect for washing away that safari dust.

National parks of unlimited size and grandeur, animals in their tens of thousands...this is Africa in all its rare and special splendour.



anzania's trump card is the Serengeti, its sweeping savannah grasslands and unimaginably endless plains broken only by clusters of acacia, granite outcrops and termite colonies, and a landscape of creation little changed since man first arrived on the scene some three million years ago.

The Serengeti also hosts one of the world's most spectacular natural pageants, the annual wildebeest migration, but at any time of the year the park is thick with game. Of the many lodges and camps, a roll call of the best would include Lamai Serengeti, built around a kopje with incredible views of the northern plains; Namiri Plains, opened in 2014 and smack bang in the middle of big cat country; the four Singita properties, all within the Grumeti Conservancy and equally exclusive; and 'semi mobile' Serengeti Safari Camp, which moves every few months with the migrating herds.

The topographical highlight of any 'northern circuit' is the Ngorongoro Crater. Ten miles across, 2,000 feet deep and encased by towering forested walls, the world's largest volcanic caldera is not just an astonishing sight but also sanctuary to an extraordinary proliferation of wildlife. Wildebeest, zebra, gazelle, giraffe, buffalo, jackal, hyena, cheetah, leopard, lion, rhino and elephant - they're all here in staggering numbers. Although you cannot stay within the crater itself, &Beyond and Nomad have very exclusive properties on the actual rim, and idyllic Gibb's Farm is nearby among the coffee plantations of Karatu.

The Serengeti and Ngorongoro combine well with Tarangire, a smaller but beautiful national park renowned for its elephant herds that congregate along the banks of the river. And try to include a side trip to Lake Manyara, home to hundreds of stately pink flamingo but best known for its prides of tree-climbing lion.

MORE TO SEE



The 'wild west' - Head west to the remote expanses of Katavi and to Greystoke, an exotic Ottoman-style retreat on the shores of Lake Tanganyika where you can track chimpanzees in the fairytale forests of the Mahale Mountains.



The South - Travel south to the wild isolation of the Selous and Ruaha, the 'Africa of old' and teeming with game.



Zanzibar - The Spice Island's dazzling white sand beaches make for the perfect finale to your Tanzanian adventure.

Kilimanjaro - Looking for a physical challenge? Africa's highest mountain beckons. A minimum of five rigorous but non-technical days of trekking will take you to the 19,340-foot summit and back.

rom Lamai's remote perch among the rocks of Kogakuria Kopje, you can see for miles and miles across this iconic stretch of wilderness heaven, where wildebeest gather in their millions before running the gauntlet of the Mara River and vast herds of plains game are endlessly shadowed by their attendant predators. It really is wildlife theatre at its finest.

Days are spent either on foot or in rugged 4WD vehicles in the company of expert resident guides who will bring this vivid, moving canvas into even sharper and more exhilarating focus. And when you do eventually return to the lodge for a refreshing dip in the pool and that welcome sundowner, you'll be welcomed by luxurious safari 'rooms' with their own spacious verandas (for those views), amazingly good food and exceptional hosting.

Lamai Serengeti's stated mission is 'to act as a faithful guardian' of this sacred natural amphitheatre. It's no idle boast!

SOME KEY FACTS:

- Lamai is a 30-minute drive from the nearest airstrip at Kogatende in the Serengeti's northern sector.
- Twelve en suite rooms are split between Main Camp and the smaller Private Camp, each with its own bar and dining area, adjoining library and map room, and swimming pool.
- A separate and private residence, Mkombe's
 House, accommodates up to four adults and six
 children comfortably (so perfect for two families)
 and is the first of its kind in the Serengeti.
- The wildebeest migrate through Lamai and cross the nearby Mara River from July to October, but game viewing is exceptional throughout the year.
- The lodge has been given special dispensation by the park authorities for guided bush walks a rare bonus.





NOMAD TANZANIA

Lamai Serengeti is owned and run by Nomad Tanzania, whose exclusive portfolio of safari lodges and camps covers the length and breadth of the country - as far south as the Selous and west to the Mahale Mountains.




Those following the more popular northern circuit can combine **Lamai** with **Entamanu Ngorongoro**, **Kuro Tarangire** and **Serengeti Safari Camp**, a mobile canvas home from home which is always on the move in step with the migratory patterns of the game.




To the south and wildly remote are **Sand Rivers Selous**, **Kigelia Ruaha** and **Kiba Point**, a private retreat for small parties of families and friends in the heart of the Selous.



Head west toward the shores of Lake Tanganyika and you can fly camp at **Chada Katavi** before tracking chimpanzees from the Ottoman style comforts of **Greystoke Mahale**.

Back in the day, Zimbabwe was Africa's most popular safari destination. With a new dawn breaking, it is time to put this wonderful country firmly back on the map.



Beyond the banks of the great Zambezi River and the man-made shores of Lake Kariba, Zimbabwe remains unspoilt, its camps and lodges designed to be at one with the environment where bush life is old-style and the game as plentiful as anywhere on the continent.

Its largest and most famous national park, Hwange, boasts some of the best guides in Africa, the 'big five' and more than 400 bird species. Newly refurbished Somalisa is the place to stay, especially if you love elephants; they have a particular passion for the camp's swimming pool!

Its wildest and most beautiful is Mana Pools, a game rich paradise of floodplain, acacia grove and riverine forest nourished by the waters of the Lower Zambezi and a designated UNESCO World Heritage Site. Ruckomechi is the best of the riverside camps here, with bush walks, canoe safaris and tiger fishing all on the menu, as well as some spectacular birding in this stunningly pristine wetland habitat.

Zimbabwe is also home to one of the planet's most awe-inspiring natural spectacles, the Victoria Falls. Adrenaline junkies flock here to bungee jump and white water raft, and you can even picnic on an island at the very lip of the falls if you have the appetite, but you may prefer to enjoy the colonial splendour of the iconic Victoria Falls Hotel and gaze upon Livingstone's famous 'smoke that thunders' from a safe distance!





Iy into Entebbe but make your first stop the Ndali Lodge, overlooking Lake Nyiambuga and the game and chimpanzee rich forests of Kibale. Then head to Kyambura, Volcanoes' signature safari lodge in the Queen Elizabeth National Park, where the main attractions include tree climbing lion, leopard, elephant, vast herds of Ugandan kob, wonderful views of the Ruwenzori Mountains and few other tourists.

Nothing though will come close to the experience of tracking the mountain gorilla through the impenetrable vegetation of the Bwindi Forest, one of its last remaining refuges. Be prepared for some tough walking, but the rewards of getting to within touching distance of these magnificent but endangered creatures, who share 97.7% of our DNA, will last forever.






For those ready to heed the call of the wild, and not afraid of adventure, this land of steamy jungles is on the verge of becoming one of Africa's finest ecotourism destinations.



onsider this. The Congo Basin contains the greatest number of mammals, primates, birds, amphibians, fish and swallowtail butterflies in Africa. Half the world's population of lowland gorilla, $oldsymbol{\mathcal{A}}$ forest elephant and the rarely seen bongo antelope inhabit the largest undisturbed stands of tropical forest on the planet. As do such proboscally exotic creatures as the slender-snouted crocodile and puttynosed monkey. This is no longer the 'Heart of Darkness' but Africa unmasked, beautiful and powerful.

The easiest part of any Congo trip is the planning of it. Essentially, safaris follow the same pattern and combine a few nights in each of the Ndzehe Concession and the Odzala-Kokoua National Park where the camps are simple but comfortable and the flora and fauna at their colourful best. Ngaga, for example, is truly Gorilla central! At the same time, It is nature at its most untrammelled and a very real adventure, with 'wet walking' in energy sapping tropical conditions the only way to access both the wilderness and the wildlife.







The fourth largest island in the world, Madagascar is an intriguing mix of stunning mountain landscapes, plateaux carpeted with dense tropical vegetation, and superbly remote white sand beaches.



The 'Grande Ile' is also home to the endemic, amusing and omnipresent lemur, and a natural diversity that more than makes up for a somewhat fragile infrastructure. Wildlife reserves harbour some 15,000 species of flora and fauna (again endemic to the island), extraordinary fossilised forests and fantastic geological formations are the result of centuries of erosion, while the unique Malagasy 'cult of ancestors' is powerfully represented by the numerous tombs to be found across the country richly decorated with sculpted totems and zebu horns.

In a destination of this size and scope there is no shortage of options, but try not to miss such highlights as the lemurs' favourite playground of Andasibe, the spectacular landscapes of Isalo, the spiny forests of Berenty and the tropical paradise of Manafiafy.





The legends of great explorers are stitched into Zambia's very fabric, its landscapes little changed since David Livingstone trekked its high places and game-rich valleys. Nowhere is this better illustrated than in the country's dominating feature, the South Luangwa National Park.



Tith some of the highest concentrations of wildlife on the planet, the game viewing in the South Luangwa is quite exceptional. Gathered here are lion, leopard and elephant, herds of zebra, puku, impala and kudu, and around 50 hippos for every mile of river. It's a zoo turned inside out!

The valley belongs within the Great Rift, Africa's massive geological cleavage, through which flows the Luangwa River. Many of the park's lodges sit on its banks or beside its many lagoons, cast offs from its previous meanders and gathering spots for animals. Robin Pope, one of the country's leading safari names, owns Nkwali, Nsefu and Tena Tena, while luxurious Chinzombo belongs to Norman Carr, another Luangwa luminary.

There may be a gentle, almost rural quality to the valley's shaded woodland glades and grasslands, but the ambience is hardly pastoral. Behind Luangwa's green innocence anything could happen, especially when you're on a walking safari.

And walking on the wild side, together with the professionalism of its guides, is what has made the Luangwa world-renowned. Day and night game drives are of course an option, but with few roads moving on foot from camp to camp is the most rewarding and exhilarating way to explore the park. No wonder many old safari hands consider this the epitome of the 'real' Africa.

If time allows, it is well worth adding a few days in the beautiful Lower Zambezi National Park, where you can fish and canoe among the crocodile and hippo. Stay here on the banks of the Zambezi at one of Anabezi, Chiawa, Chongwe or Sausage Tree, all of them with wonderful views across the river.

MORE TO SEE



Lake Malawi - The most convenient and cost effective R&R post-safari. Snorkel, sail, bird watch or simply soak up the expansive lake views from either Pumalani or Kaya Mawa.




Kafue / Busanga - An uncharted wilderness in the middle of the country, where the great herds roam unhindered and which defines Zambia's soubriquet as the 'wild heart of Africa'.

The Okavango is Botswana's, if not Africa's, most precious natural treasure. It is also the largest inland delta in the world, a vast biomass of lagoons, water channels and islands that, quite bizarrely, lies within the arid Kalahari, the largest desert on the planet. And as a sanctuary for wildlife, this wetland paradise has few rivals.



afaris in the Delta are as much on water as on land. Indeed, the Okavango experience is best illustrated by the *mokoro* which, poled by guides through papyrus reeds and carpets of water lilies, will immerse you in a low level world of carmine bee eaters, kingfishers, lilac breasted rollers and other incandescent plumages.


But Botswana is so much more than just the Okavango. Some of Africa's greatest herds of elephant move through the northerly Chobe National Park in the dry season. At the same time, big game viewing is as good as it gets in the adjacent private concessions of Selinda and Kwando Linyanti, while to the south the Kalahari is more about San bushmen, meerkats and quad bike adventures across the spectacular desolation of the Makgadikadi salt pan.

And in a country that seems to define superlatives, Botswana also lays justifiable claim to the finest lodges and camps on the continent. Located in very different eco systems, yet just a 30 minute or so hop apart by a dragonfly of a plane, each of these wilderness hideaways has around 50,000 acres of reserve all to itself.


A far from conclusive list might include Selinda Explorers, tucked away on the Spillway which has magically begun to flow again after years of drought; Little Vumbura and Gomoti Plains, both within the Delta and very picturesque with lots of land and water based activities on the menu; and Lebala, an intimate little camp at the heart of the Kwando concession and the place to see wild dog.





Defining Africa's south west coast, Namibia's raw and untamed landscapes cry out for exploration, yet sit comfortably within the compass of the independent traveller.



 ${\red{\mathcal{T}}}$ ith more than 300 days of sunshine a year and a climate that is ideal during the school summer holidays, it is a destination that also works well for families. Hire a 4WD and take to some of the most open, grandest and emptiest of roads on the planet. The plethora of distracting scenes along the way will stifle any 'when are we going to get there' moans from the back seat!

Most of Namibia's wildlife, and indeed most of Africa's big game species, can be found in the Etosha National Park, with its central Pan attracting huge numbers of animals. Ongava, on a private concession to the south of the park, is the place to stay for a more exclusive Etosha experience.

Dividing Etosha from the coast is Damaraland, a dramatic mountain desert environment remarkable for its wealth of ancient rock engravings and strange geological formations, which include a 200 million

year old petrified forest. Elephant, lion and leopard can sometimes be found here, and you can also track Namibia's rare, desert-adapted black rhino.

To the west lies the uninhabited and hauntingly beautiful wilderness of the Skeleton Coast. So named not just for the many ships that have foundered on its shores, but also for the whale and sea bones found scattered along its beaches.

To the south are the drifting sand seas and towering dunes of the Namib Desert, thought to be the oldest in the world. Stay here at Kulala, set amidst the awe inspiring scenery of the NamibRand, and rise early to climb one of these 300 metre natural masterpieces at nearby Sossusvlei. From the top, you can watch the colours fluctuate from peach to crimson as dawn breaks over the silent expanse of the desert.


Skeleton Coast - Best experienced on a fly in safari with the Schoemans. Your pilot guide will reveal a moving canvas of dunes, deep canyons and ancient river courses before landing on isolated beaches and desert strips.

Okonjima - Track leopard and cheetah on foot with the Africat Foundation.

verlooking the Hoanib River on the edge of the Palmwag Concession, the camp is set deep within Kaokoland, an utterly remote wilderness defined by sweeping deserts, rolling sand dunes and jagged mountains. There are just six guest tents, designed to blend seamlessly with the environment and each with private veranda looking out across the grand emptiness of it all.

Equally impressive is the way Africa's wildlife has adapted itself, not just to survive but to flourish amidst this harshly beautiful desolation. Game drives will follow dry river beds in search of elephant, lion and giraffe, as well as kudu, oryx and the endangered black rhino, while guided walks will introduce you to some of the smaller desert adaptations. Keen birdwatchers should also keep their eyes peeled for Monteiro's hornbills, Ruppell's korhaans and Verreuax's eagles.

So, let this elegant, intimate eco-camp immerse you in the magic and magnitude of Namibia. It really is an experience like no other, here 'where the elephants roam'.

- Fly into Hoanib's private airstrip from Windhoek or hire a 4x4 and drive yourself to camp.



The restored wharves and warehouses of the Victoria and Alfred Waterfront spell Cape Town at its most animated, but other must see attractions include Robben Island, the Cape of Good Hope and any number of stunning beaches. There are also many great places to stay, but try Welgelegen, a charming B&B just off Kloof Street and a short stroll from the city's best restaurants.

Wines and vines are of course essential ingredients of any visit to the Cape. Two of the grandest Cape Dutch estates, Groot Constantia and Klein Constantia (whose

wine was served by Sun King Louis XIV at Versailles), can be seen without leaving the city, but find the time to drive out to Stellenbosch or Franschhoek, where vineyard meets mountain in exquisite perfection.

For a longer drive follow the Garden Route. Highlights of this iconic road trip include Tsitsikamma, whose meadows of native 'fynbos' are classified by botanists as one of the Earth's seven floral kingdoms; the white sand beaches and azure seas of Plettenburg Bay; whale watching in Hermanus from July to December; and the seafood restaurants of Knysna (order the oysters!).

And don't miss out on the 'big five'...best seen in the worldrenowned Sabi Sands Game Reserve on the edge of the Kruger, where you can choose either the elegant simplicity of Notten's Bush Camp or the uber luxury of Londolozi.

Then head inland, either with a guide or your own 4x4, to explore a country that's a rich blend of traditional Arabian culture, historic forts, beautiful mosques and

wild mountains. Best to base yourself in the interior at Alila's stunning Jebel Akhdar resort, perched 2,000 metres above sea level with spectacular and expansive views of the Al Hajar from its horizon view suites.

Essential highlights include the ancient capital of Nizwa and its Friday morning livestock market, a sight unchanged since Biblical times; the medieval mountain oasis of Misfah on the slopes of Jabal Akhdar; the coastal town of Sur, where traditional Arabian dhows are still built; and the Wahiba Sands, a Lawrence of Arabia world of immense, rolling, golden dunes that stretch for more than 100 miles. You can spend the night here at the aptly named Desert Nights Camp under a blazing canopy of stars. Utterly romantic.


