WHY I LOVE THE USA

If you've never been to the USA, you probably feel you already know it rather well, from its legacy of Hollywood movies, TV box sets, literature and musical heritage. But there's nothing that beats seeing it in the flesh.

You'll invariably kick off with a city. New York is the cultural hub of the universe - or so New Yorkers argue, citing its myriad museums, galleries, shops and diverse neighbourhoods.

But even in the east there's some serious competition. From Boston, for example, a much softer, leafier gateway, rich in art and oozing with historical pedigree, or imperial Washington with its squint-white marble memorials and monuments. And not forgetting Chicago, where 'high rise' is synonymous with architectural magnificence.


Summer in most American cities will come as something of a climate shock. Despite the air conditioning, you'll crave rural horizons and coastal escapes. In the east, the shores (and the lobsters!) of Maine or Cape Cod beckon, while inland the perfect season is the Fall when New England showcases a riot of blazing colours.

In the west, Los Angeles and San Francisco are also gateways to an array of Californian pleasures, from the vineyards of the Napa Valley to the towering granite walls of Yosemite. For sun and fun, head for the coast, perhaps driving the spectacularly scenic Pacific Highway to Santa Barbara and Big Sur, the jewel in the crown of America's many classic road trips. Fly further west and you'll come to tropical, dreamy Hawaii, the most remote island chain in the world.


The Deep South is a feast of music with Nashville the capital of country, New Orleans of jazz and Memphis, famously the home of Graceland, of blues. The South is also a feast of food, from grits to gumbo, fancy French Creole to fried chicken. History abounds too, on show in the scores of antebellum plantation homes, civil rights museums and heritage trails.

The USA is also a National Park wonderland. The oldest and most iconic of these sanctuaries is Yellowstone, a nature-in-the-raw landscape of geysers, bubbling pools and domed monoliths which echo to the howl of coyotes. Riders will feel especially at home on the range here in Wyoming, with dude ranches dotted across the state and neighbouring Montana.

But the Oscar for the USA's top topographical marvel goes to the mile-deep chasm of the Grand Canyon, 'the one great site that every American should see,' according to Theodore Roosevelt. Brits too. Combine it with Monument Valley and Utah's own outstanding portfolio of national parks on an unforgettable road journey through the 'Wild West'.



SAN FRANCISCO TO SAN DIEGO











Begin in San Francisco. Bound on three sides by water, its roller-coaster streets lined with pastel pretty Victorian houses, San Francisco is a city of neighbourhoods, ranging from enormous Chinatown to Italian North Beach and each with a distinctive social demographic. It also has a rich stock of museums.

Drive slowly south towards Los Angeles, hugging the voluptuous ocean shoreline on Pacific Highway 1 via Big Sur. This is one of the most scenic drives on the planet, so take your time and stop off at the artsy town of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Randolph Hearst's magnificent castle and Santa Barbara, picture-postcard queen of America's

'Riviera'. Allow time, too, for a couple of nights in Paso Robles where you can visit some stellar wineries and bathe in the city's famous hot springs.

'La La Land' is everything you've seen in the movies, but magnified, stretched and glamorized many times over. Essential viewings include Hollywood with its iconic 'Walk of Fame', Beverly Hills, funky Venice Beach and the exclusive boutiques on Rodeo Drive (stratospheric prices maybe, but definitely good value for a browse). And if you're travelling with the kids, then Universal Studios and Disneyland should also be on the agenda.

Low-key Santa Monica, the seaside 'west wing' of LA, feels more like a stand-alone resort than part of the general urban sprawl. Here, **Shutters on the Beach** puts you within strolling distance of the historic pier with its brightly lit amusement park, solar-powered Ferris wheel and soothing ocean views.

End your Californian road trip in balmy San Diego, best known for its zoo but worth visiting for its craft breweries and art galleries. The 70-mile coastline, stringing together some of California's finest beaches, is a magnet for local surfers, sunbathers and volleyball players.





Head inland from the coast, and you'll discover rolling hillside vineyards whose produce is bottled into America's finest wines. Head further into the interior and you can explore natural sanctuaries with mile-high granite cliffs, ancient forests and sun-baked deserts where rainfall is the rarest of events.

vision of gold-green hills scattered with family-run wineries and boutique hotels...California's wine country is a dream. From Frisco, hire a car and follow route 101 north across the Golden Gate Bridge towards Sonoma and the Napa Valley, whose renowned vineyards produce America's finest wines. Stay at least three nights and devote your days to private wine tastings, cycling through scenic countryside and indulging in contemporary, farm-to-table cuisine.

From here it's just a short turn inland to the vertical world of Yosemite National Park, where waterfalls hang from 3,000-foot granite cliffs like bridal veils. Visit either in high summer for the best weather, the spring for the sea of wildflowers that carpet the valley floor, or the chillier winter months for a chance to view the park's iconic granite landmarks frosted in snow.

Yet more extreme landscapes await further south in the appropriately named Death Valley National Park, one of the hottest and driest places on earth where sun-baked dunes and water-sculpted canyons harbour a surprising diversity of life. Base yourself at the **Inn at Death Valley**, whose natural spring-fed pool remains a balmy 30°C even on the coolest of desert nights.

Lying just over the state line in neighbouring Nevada, Las Vegas makes for a fabulous finale. With its lavishly themed hotels, glitzy casinos and wacky, over-the-top buildings - an Eiffel Tower one minute, Venice Grand Canal the next - this money-making desert oasis induces the same sorts of extreme opinions as Marmite. But even if you don't gamble a cent, you can still dine in Michelin-star restaurants, browse high-end boutiques and enjoy world-class shows such as Cirque du Soleil and the Blue Man Group.



From the 'Jurassic Park Falls' of Mana Waiapuna to eye-popping Waimea, famed 'Grand Canyon of the Pacific', and the sculpted beauty of the Na Pali coastline, this is helicopter flying at its spectacular finest.



A day at the volcano

Spend a day with John in Big Island's Volcanoes National Park and you'll hike to the steams, navigate a lava tube and at the end of the day watch the glow from the crater light up the night sky. A must do!



Oahu birding adventure

Search for white-rumped Shama and red-billed Leothrix, as well as the endemic Oahu Amakihi and Oahu Elepaio, on this scenic expedition through the mountains high above Waikiki to the island's leeward coast.



Surf with Kimo

It's such an integral part of Hawaiian culture, there's no better place to learn. Book a lesson with Kimo, who runs a surf school at Lahaina on Maui Island and is the proud nephew of infamous big wave rider Titus Kinimaka.

There really is something magical about the 50th US state. A string of emerald gems set with fiery volcanoes and surf-pounded beaches, Hawaii combines natural riches with a deep Polynesian heritage. Flung across the Pacific Ocean some 2,500 miles from California, this tropical paradise is surprisingly accessible.

ix hours will transport you from the urban bustle of San Francisco to the natural haven of Kauai, the oldest island in the Hawaiian chain and Jurassic Park filming location. When it comes to scenery, the 'Garden Isle' is truly unmatched - think tumbling waterfalls, rugged cliffs and green valleys draped in centuries-old rainforest. With 90% of the island inaccessible by car, a good pair of hiking boots are a must!

A short flight and you're in another paradise, Oahu, where the majority of Hawaii's diverse population reside. From the tropical glamour of Honolulu with its iconic crescent beaches to the less-developed Leeward Coast, each region has its own distinct personality. Watch pro surfers take on 30-foot waves at North Shore and experience the incredible storytelling dance of the hula at a traditional lu'au.

Studded with earth's most active volcanoes, the Big Island has the awesome power of nature on full display. Hawaii Volcanoes National

Park (site of the world's only 'drive-in' volcano) is the star attraction, but you'll also find miles of glorious coastline lapped by clear, marinerich waters. Relax between excursions at the **Fairmont Orchid**, an oceanfront oasis home to the award-winning Spa Without Walls.

Further south, Maui's black, white and red sand beaches beckon with their cobalt-blue waters and legendary surf spots. Early risers can climb the dormant Haleakala volcano to watch the most sensational sunrise from atop the clouds. It's also worth taking the ferry over to neighbouring Lanai to see playful spinner dolphins and explore tide pools carved out of volcanic rock.

The last of Hawaii's six major islands, Molokai remains relatively detached from the modern world with residents that live off the land and preserve the traditional lifestyle of their ancestors.


















For a true taste of the American West, book yourself into a dude ranch. There are those that welcome complete beginners, with riding done at the gentlest of clops, some that are more resort than ranch with all the home comforts and a range of activities, and a few that are genuine working farms where you can live the cowboy (or cowgirl!) dream and wrangle for real. Here's our pick of the best...

THE RANCH AT ROCK CREEK, MONTANA

Immersed in 6,600 acres of pure Montana wilderness, this authentic 19th-century homestead takes Western adventure to the next level with all-inclusive amenities in its luxury log homes and stylish 'glamping' cabins. The 20-plus guided activities include fly fishing in Blue Ribbon trout streams.

THE RESORT AT PAWS UP, MONTANA

Learn to throw a lasso, experience the drama of a cattle round-up and dine alfresco on prime barbecued steaks at this 37,000-acre working ranch. Accommodation wise, the Big Timber Homes and Wilderness Estates are fantastic for multi-generational families, but you can also sleep safari-style in luxury canvas tents.

TRIPLE CREEK RANCH, MONTANA

At the award-winning Triple Creek Ranch, deep in the Bitterroot Mountains, you can combine as much time in the saddle as you want (through wildflower meadows and fragrant pine forests) with hiking, white-water rafting and fun ATV adventures.

BRUSH CREEK RANCH, WYOMING

Ride free across 30,000 acres of rolling Wyoming countryside, hone your rifle shooting skills and fish in crystal clear streams at the exclusive Brush Creek Ranch. Facilities include a state-of-the-art fitness centre and atmospheric Saloon Bar complete with swinging doors and poker table.

TANQUE VERDE RANCH, ARIZONA


Founded in 1868, Tanque Verde ranks among Arizona's finest dude ranches. At the base of the Rincon Mountains, with scenic desert views, the property combines unbridled (and beginner friendly) horseback adventure with cosy, southwestern style guestrooms. Don't miss the cowboy-themed barbecues!

WILDCATTER RANCH, TEXAS

Whether for a family break or romantic escape, Wildcatter Ranch is a place to reconnect with nature at the heart of glorious North Texas Hill Country. Ride alongside Texas cowboys and test your aim at the archery range before retreating to the infinity pool.

You'll also find dude ranches in Utah and Colorado. Subject to location, some open year-round, others are seasonal, but it should be feasible to include one or more in any USA itinerary.

NATIONAL PARKS



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What do the following have in common? The Statue of Liberty, a long stretch of sandy beach on Cape Cod, a 2,000-mile footpath between Maine and Georgia, the White House, the battlefield of the Little Bighorn in Montana, and the house where Eugene O'Neill penned The Iceman Cometh? They all fall under the protective umbrella of America's National Parks Service.

Parks Service in order to 'conserve the scenery and the National Parks Service in order to 'conserve the scenery and the natural and historic objects and wildlife therein, and to provide for the enjoyment of the same in such manner and by such means as will leave them unimpaired for the enjoyment of future generations'.

Twenty-seven states have national parks, with California possessing the most (nine), followed by Alaska (eight), Utah (five) and Colorado (four). Together, they occupy more space than the entirety of the UK. Alaska's Wrangell-St. Elias, the largest at over 13 million acres, could absorb each of the nine smallest US states and is more than twice as large as all Britain's National Parks put together.







The scale and statistics are impressive, but then so is the natural legacy they are designed to protect. Here are our 'six of the best'...

1. Grand Canyon, Arizona

The earth's undisputed number-one natural wonder; a mile-deep, multi-coloured chasm carved into the plateau over some two billion years by the Colorado River. 'It's one of the great sights every American should see,' wrote Theodore Roosevelt.

And not just Americans. As well as the jaw-dropping landscape, there's a choice of active and adventurous pursuits that include hikes, mule rides (the Bright Angel Trail to the canyon floor being the most popular) and exhilarating rafting descents of the Colorado's 150 rapids.

2. Everglades, Florida

By way of complete contrast to the theme parks of Orlando and the popular beach resorts along both Atlantic and Gulf coasts, the Everglades is a subtropical wilderness of mangroves and sanctuary to a dazzling array of fauna (with crocodiles and manatees the star attractions).

Although the pancake-flat scenery may seem a little monotonous in comparison with the peaks and troughs of other parks, its ecosystem is truly unique. And such is the space and the silence, it's hard to believe that Miami is just 20 or so miles away.

3. Yellowstone, Wyoming

The oldest national park, and most famous for its thermal activity. Yellowstone's hot springs, boiling-mud cauldrons and erupting geysers are an awesome reminder of how violent the earth can be.

'Old Faithful' is the most enduring attraction, a smoking gun that fires its 130-foot plume with clockwork regularity, but the park is also home to more than 60 species of mammal, including wolf, grizzly bear, lynx, bison and elk.

4. Shenandoah, Virginia

Only a couple of hours by road from Washington, DC, Shenandoah sits astride the wonderfully scenic Skyline Drive that runs for some 100 miles along the spine of the Blue Ridge Mountains.

The park is rich in wildlife - residents include black bear and wild turkey - so a 35mph speed limit is imposed throughout.

5. Yosemite, California

'Into this one mountain mansion, nature had gathered her choicest treasures,' wrote Scottish-born 19th-century conservationist John Muir.

Perfectly described! Bulldozed by glaciers and defined by mile-high cliffs, dramatic waterfalls, old-growth forests and the iconic granite monoliths of Half Dome and El Capitan, the Yosemite Valley is beyond breathtaking.

6. Volcanoes, Hawaii

Hawaii's Big Island has a pair of super-active volcanoes. Mauna Loa is the world's largest, measuring an astonishing 31,000 feet from submarine base to summit. Kilauea is its most active, but you can drive around the crater, walk past steaming sulphur vents and watch redhot lava fizzing into the ocean.

Spring, summer and autumn, with their clear blue skies and pure mountain air, are spent hiking through wildflower-carpeted valleys, fly-fishing on the Snake River and getting up close to bears and bison on guided wildlife tours. Naturally, winter is

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egin in charismatic Atlanta, the epicentre of the Civil Rights Movement and birthplace of One of its principal figures, Martin Luther King, Jr. Trace King's extraordinary legacy in the Sweet Auburn district where his childhood home, as well as the original Ebenezer Baptist Church, has been preserved as part of a National Historical Park.

North of Atlanta lie the Great Smoky Mountains, the south's starring natural attraction whose fog-shrouded slopes straddle the Tennessee-North Carolina border. The celebrated Relais & Châteaux resort, Blackberry Farm, is a fine base for hiking these idyllic foothills, as well as trips to Dolly Parton's Knoxville, Nantahala National Forest and the famous Jack Daniel's Distillery in Lynchburg.

A few hours' drive west and you're in Nashville, the undisputed heart of country music where Ryman's Auditorium and the Country Music Hall of Fame are among the must-see musical attractions. If it's soul and rock 'n 'roll you're after, follow the signs to Memphis to visit Presley's Graceland mansion and the legendary Sun Studio where he, B.B. King and Johnny Cash all recorded albums. The National Civil Rights Museum, meanwhile, offers a moving insight into the south's complex racial history.


Natchez, the oldest town in Mississippi state, might be less familiar but should not be overlooked. Lying at one end of the scenic Natchez Trace Parkway, the town overflows with lavish antebellum mansions and plantation homes whose graceful. columned facades belie a brutal past. Nearby Vicksburg is another key site for those interested in the Civil War.

Further down the Mississippi and an exuberant display of French, Caribbean and African influences, New Orleans needs little introduction. Head straight to the French Quarter where classic jazz and blues riffs spill onto the streets from bars on Bourbon and buskers in Jackson Square.

he Pilgrim Fathers first made land at Plymouth Rock, Massachusetts, aboard the Mayflower in 1620. Today, the state's capital - leafy, walkable Boston - is still New England's gateway. Take a stroll around the historic, gas-lit neighbourhood of Beacon Hill before picking up the iconic Freedom Trail. This dotted red line on the sidewalk will lead you through 200 years of US history and past 16 of the main revolutionary sites, including the church steeple where Paul Revere hung his lanterns to warn of the impending British invasion.

To the south of Boston lies Cape Cod, a wholly maritime place with nowhere more than six miles from the sound of waves and the screech of scavenging gulls. Quiet beaches and whale watching (in season) are two of the Cape's biggest draws, but if it's links golf that you're after, then check-in to **Wequassett Resort** for access to the prestigious Cape Cod National Golf Club.

Cape Cod, in turn, is the gateway to two very different islands but both an easy ferry ride away, Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket. The former is all breezy beach grass, artisan coffee and brightly painted cottages, whilst the latter is a National Historic Landmark comprised of weathered, cedar-shingled buildings and a fascinating whaling history. Both preserve their small-town charm through a total lack of highways, traffic lights and chain-owned stores.

Make your way back onto the mainland for a tour around the glamorous, Gilded Age mansions (the former homes of America's wealthiest vacationers) lining the streets of Bellevue Avenue in Newport, Rhode Island. The city's yacht-filled harbour famously hosted the America's Cup sailing regatta a dozen times between 1930 and 1983





Though a year-round playground, New England is at its scenic best in autumn when the leaves turn colour and the bright, summer green landscape transforms into a spectacular patchwork of deep crimson, vibrant orange and rich gold. A sight well worth crossing the pond for!

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nd where better to see the seasons change than in New Hampshire, where forests (some 4.8 million acres) make up more than 80 per cent of the land. Pumpkins, corn stalks and red dairy barns dot the landscape, and the cool, crisp air makes for wonderful hikes in the White Mountains. Scenic backroad drives and cruises on Lake Winnipesaukee are also very much on the menu.

For an even deeper rural experience, cross the Connecticut River into the Green Mountains of Vermont, 'a state in a natural state' to borrow from long-time resident and poet, Robert Frost. Vermont is more rural than even Wyoming or Montana - the capital of Montpelier has a population of less than 8,000! 'Leaf peeping' hotspots include historic Woodstock and the postcard-perfect alpine village of Stowe, the 'ski capital of the east'.

Continue south to the softly rolling Berkshires and some of the prettiest villages in the US, an enchanting world of wooden churches with pencil fine spires, traditional country stores and elegant, weatherboarded inns. Head to Stockbridge for a night or two at the atmospheric **Red Lion Inn**, which dates its founding back to 1773, and a visit to the celebrated Norman Rockwell Museum - home of the world's largest collection of original Rockwell art. The Tanglewood Music Festival, held in Stockbridge every summer, is also a must for music lovers.

Find a few more days, and you can add the rocky, lighthousestudded shoreline of Maine, a state steeped in maritime history and doorstep to the wild fist of coastal glory that is Acadia National Park.



Road-tripping is a quintessential American experience. The thrill and freedom of the open highway, combined with the country's grand scale and diverse landscapes, promises real adventure. Not to mention all the hidden gems you'll uncover along the way.

With four million miles of roads, the US has more than its fair share of great drives. Here, we shortlist our favourite six...

The Grand Circle - Las Vegas to Las Vegas

This extraordinary 11-day road trip spans 1,500 miles between Utah and Arizona, encompassing six national parks, two national monuments and countless geological wonders.

Unsurprisingly, you'll be confronted with spectacular displays of nature at every turn. Ensure you have enough camera space for the emerald pools and blue skies of Zion, the colourful 'hoodoos' of Bryce Canyon, the towering red buttes of Monument Valley and the dramatic sweep of the Grand Canyon.

Note: If you prefer rail to road, and have less time available, *Rocky Mountaineer* (of Canada fame) have added a spectacular 2-day train journey between Denver and Moab to their portfolio.

Route 66

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Originally constructed in 1926 to connect rural communities with larger, urban cities in the west, Route 66 has cemented its place in popular American culture. Though officially decommissioned in 1985, the romance of the road survives, with much of the original route still paved and driveable.

The 'Mother Road' today is a nostalgic foray into classic Americana and quintessential roadside displays - think neon signs and drive-in movie theatres, old-school diners and classic motels. Other highlights include Arizona's Painted Desert, the Lincoln Home National Historic Site and St Louis' enormous Gateway Arch.





Pacific Coast Highway

Stretching virtually the entire length of the west coast, this famous cliff-hugging highway embraces over 650 miles of gorgeous Californian coastline.

En route, you can visit delightful seaside towns like Carmel-by-the-Sea and Monterey, soak in the rugged grandeur of Big Sur, admire the architectural jewel of Hearst's Castle and discover geological attractions like Bowling Ball Beach. Stop to stretch your legs in beautiful redwood forests or head further inland to the celebrated wine regions of Napa and Sonoma Valley.

Oregon Coast Highway 101 - Seattle to San Francisco

Although little known in comparison with its Pacific Coast neighbour, the eight-hour drive between Seattle and San Francisco has its own share of majestic coastal scenery.

Snaking down the Oregon coast, Highway 101 will lead you past bustling beach towns and old-growth forests, historic lighthouses and countless state parks. Cannon Beach, home of the 235-foot Haystack Rock, is particularly worth pausing for, as is the award-winning Tillamook dairy where you can enjoy a free, self-guided tour.

Blue Ridge Parkway - Virginia & North Carolina

A 469-mile ribbon twisting and turning through the green, mistshrouded valleys of the Appalachian Mountains, the Blue Ridge Parkway connects Shenandoah National Park in Virginia to the Great Smoky Mountains in North Carolina.

With a speed limit of 45mph, the route is designed to be enjoyed at a leisurely pace, with lots of scenic hiking trails, waterfalls and fishing spots to discover along the way. Keep your eyes peeled for white-tailed deer, wild turkey and the elusive black bear!

Overseas Highway - Miami to Key West

Encompassing sensational land and seascapes, the dreamy Overseas Highway (and its 42 elegant bridges) crosses turquoise waters to connect the beautiful coral cay islands known as Florida Keys.

Beginning in Miami, the 113-mile route can be accomplished in just four hours, but allot more time for the sea turtle hospital in Marathon Key, the sports fishing hotspot of Islamorada and the Bahia Honda State Park with its superb snorkelling and kayaking. Finish in Ernest Hemingway's former home, Key West.



Los Angeles

From the exclusive boutiques along Rodeo Drive to the cutting-edge restaurants in Little Tokyo, the movie star mansions of Beverly Hills to the electric energy of Koreatown, there are many different sides to the starspangled City of Angels.

This is the heart of the nation's film and television industry, so be sure to get a behind-the-scenes glimpse at all the action with tours around Paramount Pictures, Universal Studios and Warner Brothers. Other essential stops include the buzzing Grand Central Market, the glamorous rock clubs lining Sunset Strip and, for the culture vulture, the sky-lit galleries of the Getty with its vast collection of European art. Sun lovers can soak up the Californian rays on free-spirited Venice Beach or stroll along the promenade to neighbouring, more refined Santa Monica.

And when you need to escape the hustle and bustle, head into the hills on a late-afternoon hike around Mount Hollywood, popping into the Griffith Observatory for uninterrupted city views.

Stay at: Andaz West Hollywood, Casa del Mar, Shutters on the Beach



San Francisco

A sprawl of steep hills in northern California, San Francisco, like all great cities, is made up of uniquely different neighbourhoods. These include student Berkeley, hippy historic Haight-Ashbury, the largest Chinatown in North America and distinctly Italian North Beach where you can peruse the aisles of the legendary City Lights Bookstore.

San Francisco's open-sided cable car system has been around since the 1870s and is still a fun way of exploring places like Fisherman's Wharf, Lombard Street and Union Square. Other highlights include cycling across the Golden Gate Bridge, wandering the infamous prison island of Alcatraz and experiencing a virtual earthquake in the excellent California Academy of Sciences. Or head to Pier 39 for another classic Frisco sight - sea lions.

Stay at: Argonaut, St. Regis, The Battery

Austin

On top of an increasingly dynamic culinary scene (starring food trucks, BBQ joints and the choicest farm-to-table restaurants), Texas' state capital has earned a reputation as the 'Live Music Capital of the World'. South by Southwest and Austin City Limits are the two main festivals of note, but you can also catch live country, blues and rock performances every night in the myriad bars and clubs about town. Another attraction is the pink marbled, Revival-style Texas Capitol building which, at over 300 feet tall, overshadows its Washington D.C. counterpart.

Austin is very much an outdoorsy city, with miles of much-loved cycling, walking and jogging trails. Take a kayak out on Lady Bird Lake or head next door to swim in the refreshing, spring-fed waters of Barton Springs Pool.

Stay at: Austin Proper, Kimpton Van Zandt, The Driskill

Chicago

Chicago is the classic American city, an open-air museum of architecture and one of the few places in the world where the words 'high rise' are synonymous with structural magnificence. 'Make no little plans,' urged city planner Daniel H Burnham, 'they have no magic to stir men's blood.'

To appreciate its fine looks, take a Chicago's First Lady cruise on the city's eponymous waterway before riding the escalator to the airy summit of Willis Tower. For a more architectural bias to your trip, head out to Oak Park, a quiet semi-rural village where Frank Lloyd Wright's prairie-style masterpieces abound. You can also visit his home and studio.

There are many museums here too, but one not to miss is the Art Institute of Chicago in Millennium Park, one of the city's many green acreages on the shores of Lake Michigan.

Stay at: Soho House, The Langham, The Peninsula



New Orleans

A boisterous, jazz-loving city with a penchant for street parties, there's nowhere quite like New Orleans. African, American, Caribbean and European cultures merge in the 'Big Easy', so-named after the locals' laidback way of life, to form an irresistible melting pot of history, music and food on the banks of the Mississippi.

Take your time as you wander the evocative French Quarter, a National Historic Landmark where restaurants serve southern staples and music fills the air from every bar, club and street-corner saxophonist. At its heart, Bourbon Street embodies New Orleans' party spirit with a buzzing, round-the-clock nightlife. Make time, too, for a stroll around the leafy Garden District with its extravagant antebellum mansions and historic Lafayette Cemetery.

Stay at: Peter & Paul, Soniat House, The Roosevelt

Miami

Miami's 'party city' reputation centres around the glam neighbourhood of South Beach where you'll find trendy nightclubs, classy rooftop bars and celebrity-fronted fusion restaurants. Not to mention an array of beautifully preserved Art Deco buildings. By day, head for the shops along Lincoln Road and the opulent Versace Mansion on Ocean Drive, formerly owned by Italian designer Gianni Versace.

Miami has more serious cultural attractions in leafy Coconut Grove, namely the Vizcaya Museum and Gardens on Biscayne Bay, the lavish former estate of businessman James Deering. For street art at its most cutting edge, go to Wynwood Walls, whilst Little Havana and its main drag Calle Ocho welcomes you with Cuban cigars and steaming cups of café con leche.

Stay at: COMO Metropolitan Miami Beach, Faena Miami Beach, The Betsy

Charleston

There's quite a small-town charm to Charleston, despite being South Carolina's largest city. In fact, it's one of the friendliest places in the US, with locals who embody that famous southern hospitality.

It's also a city of deep-rooted history, one that stretches beyond the Civil War to its founding in 1670. Every building, street and home in Charleston has a story to tell, especially in the romantic, cobbled French Quarter with its pastel-painted antebellum houses, horse-drawn carriages and spired churches. You can also wander America's oldest public gardens at the historic Magnolia Plantation or ride the ferry over to Fort Sumter, where the first shots of the American Civil War were fired.

Stay at: Belmond Charleston Place, The Dewberry, Zero George Street

Washington

Washington is one of the world's great imperial cities, its squint-white marble memorials and monuments, towering statuary, triumphal avenues, obelisks, shrines and stately edifices every inch as majestic as those in Paris or Rome, Vienna or St Petersburg.

In many ways, Washington is a surprisingly un-American city, full of breadth, incised by wide boulevards, punctuated with circuses and partitioned by parks. A fifth of the map is shaded green. Washington's famous National Mall is not a shoppers' paradise with branches of Gap or Walmart, but a swathe of grass and gravel, a déjà vu of the Tuileries Gardens in Paris rather than utterly urban USA.

Washington is also a repository for some of America's greatest treasures. Stretching for two miles, from the arm-chaired Abe at the Lincoln Memorial to the Capitol, the Mall is lined with fourteen separate














New York

Whether it's your first visit or your fiftieth, the 'Big Apple' never ceases to amaze. As sandbanks shift, so neighbourhoods are always changing, run-down blocks are renovated, and chic stores open in previous no-go zones. Begin in Washington Square, the heart of Greenwich Village and hub of the old Beat culture. From there, pick up the High Line elevated walkway and head for the new Whitney Museum of American Art and bustling Chelsea Market food court.

Walk off lunch with a stroll around Central Park. Book tickets for the MOMA and view its collection of Picassos, Matisses and Jackson Pollocks. By way of contrast, the Frick Collection is full of Old Masters, and for serious art lovers, there's the original Whitney and the Guggenheim, housed in Frank Lloyd Wright's distinctive 'helter-skelter' building.

For dramatic views of the New York skyline, don't miss out on your free ride past the Statue of Liberty on the Staten Island Ferry, before heading back towards Wall Street and the deeply moving 9/11 Memorial and Museum.

Boston

Boston is a city for walkers. Take a stroll around the historic, gas-lit neighbourhood of Beacon Hill. Then pick up the Freedom Trail, a line of red dots on the sidewalk that will lead you through 200 years of history and past several revolutionary sites, including the church steeple where Paul Revere hung his lanterns to warn of the impending British invasion.

'God made Boston on a wet Sunday,' wrote Raymond Chandler, which might explain why the city also has so many excellent museums. In affluent Back Bay, there's the Museum of Fine Arts and the unique Isabella Stewart Gardner, a Venetian mansion groaning with treasures from Rembrandts to Rubens that were collected by this 19th-century society queen and philanthropist.

Two worthy but very different waterfront attractions include the Aquarium and the powerful Kennedy Museum housed in IM Pei's striking building. And if time allows, ride 'The T' subway to Cambridge on the north bank of the Charles River to explore the prestigious Harvard campus and one or two of its museums. Pick of the collections would include the 800 species of flowers beautifully crafted from glass in the Botanical Museum, and the Islamic art in the Sackler Gallery.
